That’s a lot of setting up tables and chairs and making sure AV equipment was working...which wasn’t always the case. She was also instrumental in developing the Department’s first automated training record system which helped save everyone a lot of time. Janet loved her job, but since her husband had been retired since March of 1997, it was time to follow suit, so she retired from the DNR after 34-1/2 years.


Janet met her husband, Lee Kernan, while at the DNR which started a real adventure in her life.
